DISCOVER LOST HORSE MINE

FIELD CLASS / SPRING 2024 / INSTRUCTOR: PAM KERSEY & TOM SCANLAN MARCH 17, 7:00 AM - 1:00 PM

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Association

Join us for a trip back to the California Gold Rush, Joshua Tree style. In this class we will explore the Lost Horse Mine, a classic Western mill and mining site. The moderate 3.8 mile out and back hike follows an old freighter road to the remains of the wooden structure that once housed a 10-stamp mill. Our instructors will discuss the geologic forces that formed the area, and we'll find out how that gold got deposited there in the first place. We will learn about the history of the Lost Horse mine, some of the colorful characters associated with it and we'll learn about gold mining and processing as it was typically done in the American West.

The area that now comprises Joshua Tree National Park attracted cattle ranchers in the mid 1800's as a place to graze cattle. Mining activity began in the region around the 1870's reaching its peak during the 1920's and 1930's. Gold was the main objective, but quantities of silver, copper, lead, and other metals were also mined. A few active claims lingered into the 1970's before mining activity ceased. Approximately 288 mining sites are located within the current park boundaries. Some consist of small exploratory digs while other sites still have extensive shafts, abandoned mining and milling equipment, tanks, concrete, wood, and stone structures.

PROGRAM AGENDA

We'll meet at the Joshua Tree Visitor Center parking lot at 7:00am and do a quick check in and safety orientation. We will then caravan to Lost Horse Mine Trailhead at about 7:15am and begin our hike at 7:30am. We will reach the overlook at around 10a and will have a lunch break (bring your own lunch/snacks/& water). By 1:00pm we will be back in the parking lot and the class will end.

MEETING LOCATION

Joshua Tree Visitor Center, 6554 Park Blvd, Joshua Tree, CA 92252 approximately "5.1" miles from the west entrance in Joshua Tree

Please arrive on time; we start classes promptly, and in the case of hikes or other classes on the go, we cannot wait for students who arrive late.

REQUIRED PREPARATION*

Waiver: All participants must complete the <u>participation waiver</u> at least 24 hours before a class begins. *Failure to do so may forfeit your right to participate.*

Park Pass (\$30 per vehicle): For classes inside Joshua Tree National Park, participants are now required to purchase a <u>park pass</u>. You can purchase a park pass <u>online</u>, or pay at a park entrance. If you have an existing pass you may use that at the entrance!

ACTIVITY LEVEL

MODERATE Participants must be in good physical condition for courses/activities in a desert that may be hot, dry, windy, and sometimes surprisingly cold. Please contact us if you have questions about your ability to participate.

WHAT'S INCLUDED

• First aid and emergency supplies for the group

WHAT'S NOT INCLUDED

- Admission to Joshua Tree National Park
- Meals, Lodging, or Transportation

WHAT TO BRING

The essentials for all field courses:

- Water, between 3 and 4 liters per person for a full day outing
- Food and snacks, easily packed and eaten in the field (please leave no trace)
- Close-toed athletic shoes or hiking boots; no sandals, not even hiking sandals!
- Sun protection: hat, sunglasses, sunscreen; light-colored long-sleeved shirts are recommended and very effective on hot days
- Warm layers for cooler mornings/evenings (it can be surprisingly cold!)
- Backpack to carry food, water, and any personal items you need for the day

Required for this course:

- Water (at least 3 liters)
- Food (your lunch & snacks)
- Snacks and beverages for campfires Friday and Saturday night
- Hiking pack
- Hiking shoes

- Sunscreen
- Hat
- Hiking poles

For classes meeting inside the park, it can take up to 45 minutes to go through an entrance gate on weekends after 9am (though 15-20 minutes is typical). Please allot time to park, as parking lots tend to be congested between 10am and 4p in the busy season. *There is no cell service in the park*, please plan accordingly.

WHAT IF I NEED TO CANCEL?

Desert Institute will provide a full refund if we are notified more than 14 days in advance. We are unable to process refunds for *any* cancellations less than 14 days in advance.

DOES DESERT INSTITUTE CANCEL ACTIVITIES FOR WEATHER OR LOW ENROLLMENT?

If we do not meet our minimum of 6 registered participants for any given activity, we will likely cancel the activity with at least 48+ hours notice.

Desert Institute runs classes rain or shine, with the exception of astrophotography classes, which require mostly clear skies in order to be successful.
